Robin and his wife Carol Edelstein are both talented writers, are very involved with the writing community in the area, and run two weekly writing workshops at their home. Robin is committed to community access television and would like to be on the NCTV Board.

Barbara Goldin

Barbara Goldin resides in Leeds. She is the children's librarian at the Emily Williston Memorial Library in Easthampton Ma. She has volunteered at the national media reform organization Free Press and volunteered at their three National Conferences.

Barbara was a teacher for 21 years and has taught creative writing work shops to teachers and children in libraries and schools all over the country. She has published numerous books and articles.

Barbara's interest in media came about when her daughter entered the army in 2001. Barbara became frustrated by the lack of good news sources and quickly realized the importance of local independent media. A few years later this led her to NCTV, which at the time was under the auspices of Comcast. Barbara followed the city's negotiations with Comcast closely, becoming a regular attendee at the CAB meetings, providing input and feedback, and helping to organize local residents to become involved in the founding of an independent non-profit community television channel.
